



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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

OCTOBER IS NATIONAL DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH

Domestic violence is an unfortunate reality that occurs within every class, age group, race and religion. It happens in families, friendships and intimate relationships. Intimate partner violence happens within same and different sex partnerships. It happens whether people are married, living together or dating.

Approximately one in four women has been a victim of domestic violence. October is National Domestic Violence Awareness Month - a time established to draw attention to this unspeakable crime and continue efforts to raise awareness and stop the violence.

Domestic Violence Awareness Month evolved from the first Day of Unity observed in October 1981 by the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence. The intent was to connect battered women's advocates across the nation who were working to end violence against women and their children.

The Day of Unity soon became a special week when a range of activities were conducted at the local, state and national levels. In October 1987, the first Domestic Violence Awareness Month was observed. That same year the first national toll-free hotline was begun.

In 1989 the first Domestic Violence Awareness Month Commemorative Legislation was passed by the U.S. Congress. Such legislation has passed every year since.

- On average, nearly 20 people per minute are physically abused by an intimate partner in the United States. During one year, this equates to more than 10 million women and men.
- 1 in 3 women and 1 in 4 men have been victims of some form of physical violence by an intimate partner within their lifetime.
- 1 in 5 women and 1 in 7 men have been victims of severe physical violence by an intimate partner in their lifetime.
- 1 in 7 women and 1 in 18 men have been stalked by an intimate partner during their lifetime to the point in which they felt very fearful or believed that they or someone close to them would be harmed or killed.
- On a typical day, there are more than 20,000 phone calls placed to domestic violence hotlines nationwide.
- In domestic violence homicides, women are six times more likely to be killed when there is a gun in the house.
- Intimate partner violence accounts for 15% of all violent crime.

 Women between the ages of 18-24 are most commonly abused by an intimate partner.

The Purple Ribbon Council has requested that we all wear purple ribbons during October and November to signify Domestic Violence Awareness.

Today, her vision has come to life in 121 countries around the world.

NOVEMBER 25, 2020 INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ELIMINATION OF VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN



Violence against women and girls is one of the most widespread violations of human rights. According to a 2013 WHO global study, 35 per cent of women worldwide have experienced either physical and/or sexual violence. However, some national studies show that up to 70 per cent of women have experienced physical and/or sexual violence in their lifetime from an intimate partner. To raise awareness and trigger action to end this global scourge, the UN observes the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women on November 25th. The date marks the brutal assassination in 1960 of the three Mirabal sisters, political activists in the Dominican Republic.

Every year, November 25th and the ensuing 16 Days of Activism against Gender Violence which follow (ending on December 10th, Human Rights Day) are commemorated around the world, providing individuals and groups a chance to mobilize and call attention to the urgent need to end violence against women and girls.

The 2020 Golden West Region Virtual District 1 Fall Meeting was held on October 17, 2020.

This year theme was "A Leap of Faith" and the meeting was hosted by our Golden West Region governor Laurie Moses.

The first topic that was addressed at the meeting was "member engagement" since a lot of clubs are not meeting face-to-face right now due to the Covid-19 pandemic. We discussed how to enhance member engagement via Zoom.

Some ideas to encourage member engagement were to celebrate member's birthdays, share recipes, keep in contact by calling members and having a buddy system with the current members in each Soroptimist club.

The ideas that were presented for "Dream It, Be It" to extend services were a drive for supplies, helping "Dream It, Be It" girls with applying for colleges or vocational schools and offering scholarships.

Global impact for our "Live your Dream Awards" includes:

- Impacting 1,595 women.
- \$2.4 million allocated.
- 93% of recipients reported increased self-esteem.
- 97% of recipients are now living in a safe environment.

Global impact for "Dream It, Be It" includes:

- 14,547 girls have participated.
- 91% are confident about their future success.
- 88% feel more prepared to pursue career goals.
- 85% have new tools to help them overcome obstacles facing their success.

Soroptimist International of Riverside was presented with a certificate for participation in the "Live Your Dream Education & Training Awards" program.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY WASHER/DRYER DONATION



We are almost done with the four homes on Myers Street in Riverside and are getting prepared for the final stretch. The home dedication and key ceremony will probably be right after Thanksgiving.

We did not build homes the last couple of years, so three of the four families in this project are single moms (one is a veteran) and we are using the SI Riverside grant to purchase a washer/dryer for each of these three homes.



I'll keep you posted but would love to have SI Riverside members at the dedication to be able to present the washer/dryers to the moms. Meantime, in case you haven't seen a Habitat project, the photo below will show you how we are doing. The cabinets are in (soft close doors and drawers), the countertops are in (quartz), we have the final color coat of stucco next week and then we can pour the patios front and back. Last up, the driveway and landscaping.



Of course, then there are the final interior finishes like lighting, plumbing fixtures and trim around doors that we'll be working on concurrently. Our big challenge will be recruiting everyone we know who is willing to help us put in the flooring. (Waterproof, vinyl laminate flooring.) No more carpeting because it seems like every family adds a dog as soon as escrow closes!

By the way, I was touring a community leader through the Myers Street site and when I explained that SI Riverside generously donated the money to supply the three single moms with washer/dryers, she volunteered to write a check for the fourth family. Now all four families will start their life in their new homes with a full laundry!

All of the other appliances are supplied through Whirlpool Corp. which is also totally cool!

I'll keep you posted.

SOLT Soroptimist Orientation and Leadership Training



General Club Structure and Purpose

Soroptimist clubs are organized with a recommended minimum of 12 regular members. Each club maintains a charter as long as it remains current in all financial obligations to the region and federation and has submitted all required final reports from federation club grants and disaster relief grants. Clubs not in good standing are not eligible to vote in federation elections or mail ballots and cannot receive grants or awards from the federation.

If a club has less than 12 regular members, they are notified by the federation that they are below the number of members recommended to maintain a club. Those clubs are encouraged to recruit more members and to seek advice from their region and the federation. As long as the club remains current in all financial obligations to the region and federation submits and all required final reports from federation club grants and disaster relief grants, the club is

considered to be in good standing. No club shall forfeit its charter due to having 11 or fewer regular members.

Clubs initiate, adopt and promote procedures and policies to attain federation and club objectives in carrying out the Soroptimist mission. Club bylaws should provide for the following:

• That the board of directors, composed of officers and board members, have administrative control over the affairs, funds and property of the club, except that of modifying any action taken by the club.

• That the president be the chief officer and direct the business of the club.

• That all standing and special committees be appointed by the president, unless otherwise provided for in the club procedures.

Each Soroptimist club operates within the framework of federation and international adopted policies, programs and bylaws, but each club assumes responsibility for formulation of Soroptimist policies by sending its informed delegates to federation conventions, region conferences and district fall meetings.

Clubs retain their individual character. They hold meetings, invite speakers, arrange discussions leading to research into the needs of their communities and provide service to their communities and the world. Plus, membership carries the privilege of attending Soroptimist club meetings anywhere in the world!
