FOUNDERS DAY

OCTOBER 3, 1921



Members of the first Soroptimist club, SI of Alameda County, with their guests celebrating the club's 3rd anniversary in 1924.

At the beginning of the 1920's, women in North America had established themselves in the political arena through suffrage and in the professional world as a result of World War 1. The time was right for women actively engaged in professions and careers to come together for mutual support and friendship and to serve the communities to which they belonged. The time was right for Soroptimist.

In the spring of 1921, Stuart Morrow, an organizer of men's service clubs, visited Oakland, California. In search of a potential member for an Optimist Morrow called club, the Parker-Goddard Secretarial School, presuming it was run by men and found instead Miss Adelaide Goddard and Miss Mabel Parker owned the school. Explaining his mistake, Morrow excused himself. As Morrow left, Miss Goddard remarked that she would be interested in joining such a club for women if he ever considered forming one.

Goddard's remark set the wheels in motion for Stuart Morrow. He contacted a number of business women in the community and invited them to a preliminary meeting on May 21, 1921. Of the six women in attendance, only one showed real interest. This woman began recruiting her acquaintances and on June 21, 1921, a luncheon meeting with 10 women officially launched the club toward its goal of 80 members to receive a charter from Morrow.

This core group met once a week and continued to gather the names of eligible women from Alameda County. They also chose the name Soroptimist for the organization, coining a word from the two Latin words "soror" (woman) and "optima" (the best). Thus Soroptimist became "The Best for Women."

On September 26, 1921, the charter was closed and officers were elected with Violet Richardson Ward serving as the first president. The presentation of the charter and an installation ceremony took place on October 3, 1921, the day officially celebrated as Founders Day.

TRANSITIONAL LIVING PROGRAM



In brief, broad strokes, here are some things you should know about the Main Street Transitional Living Program. It is dedicated to helping homeless adults aged 18-21 gain essential life skills for independent living. The innovative program offers a unique chance to rebuild their lives and secure a brighter future.

Admission and Eligibility:

Admission involves a straightforward application process, followed by at least two interviews. Eligibility includes homeless youth aged 18-21 from Riverside County, former foster care youth, and emancipated

individuals under 18. Income is not required, but if present, it must be at or below HUD's low-income level for Riverside County.

Programs Offered:

This comprehensive program includes weekly counseling, education and employment assistance, financial education, access to social and legal services, and personalized case management.

Program Structure and Rules:

Participants live in furnished shared apartments with individual bedrooms. They must work at least 32 hours weekly, saving 50% of their income. Rules include visitor policies and nightly curfews. Further details can be found at:

When the Taliban took control of her region. They said music was a crime. They said women weren't allowed to go to the market. They said girls couldn't go to school.



IN CASE YOU MISSED IT



FROM THE DESK OF JOANN MOORE

This column's name, "In Case You Missed It," is especially accurate today. Sadly, I missed our September speaker, Riverside Police Department Chief Larry Gonzalez. I am grateful to Sophia Mendoza and Pam Bradford for reporting in my absence.

Our speaker for the SI Riverside Program Meeting on September 26, 2023, was Larry Gonzalez who is the current Chief of the Riverside Police Department. He has over 30 years of experience in law enforcement, having served in various roles within the Department.



He is known for his dedication to community policing and working collaboratively with community members and organizations to build relationships and trust.

Chief Gonzalez prioritizes continuing education and training for officers, command staff and civilian employees, as well as implementing technical advancements and comprehensive data collection programs and accountability.

With a commitment to excellence and state-of-the-art technology, the department aims to provide reactive and proactive services to enhance community unity and build trust through mutual respect and positive change.

Our gathering may have been small but it led to an intimate conversation with Chief Gonzalez. He shared his thoughts on the unique challenges faced by our city, the 12th largest city in California and the largest in the Inland Empire. It

was a rare opportunity to gain insights from the heart of our city's safety efforts.

Under Chief Gonzalez's leadership, the Riverside Police Department has spearheaded innovative safety programs. initiatives These form the foundation of a healthy citv underscore environment and the importance of community support.

Chief Gonzalez provided us with essential Situational Awareness and Personal Safety tips:

SEASONAL AWARENESS: The upcoming time change means that darkness will fall earlier. Adjust your routines and be prepared for lower visibility during your evening activities.

<u>SEEK AN ESCORT</u>: If you don't feel safe while walking alone, don't hesitate to seek an escort or company from a friend or family member.

PREVENT CRIMES OF OPPORTUNITY: Do not leave valuable items, packages or bags in your car where they are visible to potential thieves.

STAY PRESENT: Walking while engrossed in your phone conversation reduces your personal safety. Stay present and aware of your surroundings.

HOME SECURITY: Consider fortifying your home's security by adding cameras. Adequate lighting can also deter criminals.

<u>GET A DOG</u>: Dogs are fantastic deterrents. Their presence alone can discourage unwanted visitors and provide companionship.

<u>SELF-DEFENSE SKILLS</u>: Learning self-defensive skills is a valuable asset. They build confidence and

prepare you for unforeseen situations.

Leadership Tip: Communication is Key

Now more than ever, it is essential to have good communication skills. Not only are we interacting with our friends, family, and club members in person and on the phone, but we are also utilizing email, text, and even video chat. Add in the number of social media options to connect and share information and we're getting into double digits. The number of avenues available to communicate seems to have grown exponentially in recent years. Therefore, it is important that we effectively communicate.

Everyone can benefit by honing their communication skills. Take time to improve your own by checking out the following tips. By putting them into practice, you may find yourself being a more effective, inspirational, and motivational leader.

Listen

Take time to listen to each other. Remember that hearing and listening are different. Fight the urge to interrupt people and let them speak their opinions and thoughts. Be present in conversations, remove outside distractions, and ask questions. Great club leaders talk with their members, not at them.

Pay attention to body language

Sometimes, actions speak louder than words. If you cross your arms or have a scowl on your face, you could be sending the wrong message. Being in an international organization, we must be aware and sensitive to other cultures and customs.

Since we live in a hybrid environment, utilize video calls and take advantage of that body language as your message might be easier to understand than an email may convey.

Get to the point

Your audience will be most appreciative if you keep your message brief and simple. One study shows the attention span of humans is just eight seconds – shorter than that of a goldfish! Keep your messages specific and provide just the right amount of information.

Take notes

In today's hectic world, it can be helpful to simply put pen to paper. Taking notes can help you organize your thoughts and make certain you hit upon the high level points you want to make sure you get across. Additionally, you may want to jot down comments or questions from members so you can ensure you respond appropriately.

Choose your method

We can communicate in a variety of ways such as calling, texting, emailing, and face-to-face. Decide the best mode communication depending on what you are delivering. Use your best judgment depending on the situation. If you need to give an in-depth message, using email or a video call would be most beneficial. If you are looking to give a short message, utilize oneon-one messaging like text or chat.

Have a good attitude

Simply smiling and being positive goes a long way. Your behavior acts like a mirror and those in your presence will reflect that back to you. By having a positive attitude, people will want to be in your company and will pay more attention when you speak.


Practice empathy

Turn the tables and try to understand the point of view of others. Think about what you are saying from your audience's perspective. Dale Carnegie, the author of *How to Win Friends and Influence People* said, "The only way on earth to influence other people is to talk about what *they* want and show them how to get it."

Having strong communications, your message will be clear and misunderstandings will be greatly minimized. As an added bonus, you will be viewed with respect and seen as a more successful leader.
