JULY 30, 2024 WORLD DAY AGAINST TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS



THEME 2024

"Leave No Child Behind in the Fight Against Human Trafficking"

This year's global campaign for World Day Against Trafficking in Persons urges accelerated action to end child trafficking. Children represent a significant proportion of trafficking victims worldwide, with girls being disproportionately affected.

Additionally, children are twice as likely to face violence during trafficking than adults, according to the UNODC's Global Report on Trafficking in Persons (GLOTIP). Regions such as Sub-Saharan Africa, North Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean bear a disproportionate burden with children making up for 60 per cent of detected trafficking victims.

Amid overlapping crises such as armed conflicts, pandemics, economic hardships and environmental challenges, children are increasingly vulnerable to trafficking. Furthermore, the proliferation of online platforms poses additional risks as children often connect to these sites without adequate safeguards. Traffickers exploit online platforms, social media and the dark web to recruit and exploit children, utilizing technology to evade detection, reach wider audiences and disseminate exploitative content.

The causes of child trafficking are as diverse as the ways in which children are exploited.

Children are subjected to various forms of trafficking, including exploitation in forced labor, criminality or begging, trafficked for illegal adoption, recruitment into armed forces and online and sexual abuse and exploitation.

manifold. Root causes are including poverty, inadequate unaccompanied support of children amidst rising migration and refugee flows, armed conflicts, dysfunctional families and lack of parental care. Notably, in low-income countries, children are often trafficked for forced labor, whereas in high-income countries, sexual exploitation remains prevalent among child victims.

Identification and protection of child victims remain challenging due to underreporting, lack of awareness and inadequate resources for victim support services. Traffickers often employ coercion, deception and threats to maintain control over their victims, making it difficult for authorities to intervene.

To effectively combat this scourge, concerted efforts are needed at both national and international levels. States must prioritize child protection, bolster legislation, improve law enforcement and allocate more resources to combat child trafficking. Prevention efforts should target root causes like poverty and inequality to reduce children's vulnerability. Special attention must be paid to trafficking of children on the move.

Strengthening child protection systems and implementing childsensitive justice mechanisms are crucial for supporting victims and holding perpetrators accountable. Addressing online child exploitation requires innovative strategies, collaboration between tech companies and law enforcement and robust legal frameworks.

Civil society organizations, the private sector and communities have a vital role in raising awareness, providing support services and advocating for policy reforms.














































MAY 30 TO JUNE 1, 2024 GOLDEN WEST REGION SPRING CONFERENCE

HISTORY WALK



As often happens to us Soroptimists, we encounter challenges and learn to work through them with determination and flexibility.

On May 21, 2024, the SI Riverside History Walk Committee (including President Melanie, Vice-President JoAnn and me) met with many members of the Riverside City Staff. The primary speakers were the new Ward 1 councilmember, Philip Falcone, and Nathan Mustafa, the Public Works Director.

The purpose of the meeting was to ascertain whether the City would embrace the idea of relocating the Bicentennial History Walk to a grassy area along Tenth Street, in front of City Hall.

Mr. Mustafa relayed his concern that if stones are placed in grass, the sprinklers would calcify the stones due to its hard water.

He also mentioned that transients lounge around in that area and the area is already home to many other historical projects. Councilmember Falcone liked the idea of returning the History Walk to its roots near the Convention Center.

We discussed the fact that much development was planned for the area around the Convention Center and it was our understanding that the projects could take upwards of ten years to complete.

Mr. Mustafa referred to this grand project as the Riverside Live Project and that it would be a good time to get involved because it was in the initial phase of starting an Environmental Impact Review process. It is the hope of City Staff that the Riverside Live Project will include relocating the History Walk into its budget.

In light of the long-term nature of the Riverside Live Project, City Staff suggested creating a podium to display one stone pending completion of the Riverside Live Project.

The podium display would indicate that it would be the future home of the Bicentennial History Walk.

New possibilities are around the corner. Your History Walk Committee will keep working to make sure that the History Walk is once again out in the open for all to admire.

APPRECIATE YOUR MEMBERS

Thank you!

Did you know this simple phrase can have a powerful impact on our members? When we appreciate members, they are motivated to come to club meetings, get involved in our programs and spread the word about the work we do.

One study by the online career site Glassdoor found that more than 80 percent of employees say they are motivated to work harder when their boss shows appreciation for their work, compared to less than 40 percent who are inspired to work harder when their boss is demanding or because they fear losing their job.

Soroptimist leaders can take a cue from the business world and apply this to clubs. Some of the benefits when we appreciate members for their hard work include:

FOSTERS A HEALTHY CLUB ATMOSPHERE

This is a given. A pleasant and friendly environment where members are grateful for each other simply makes club activities such as meetings or projects a happier place that members will want to be part of and keeps them coming back for more.

INCREASD PRODUCTIVITY

Members will feel valued when they are appreciated and will strive to make improvements. For example, if the club gave one Live Your Dream Award and received ample praise, they may strive to double their impact the next year and provide TWO awards.

IMPROVED TEAMWORK

Belonging to a team, in the broadest sense, is a result of

feeling part of something bigger than YOU. A club is like a team because we are working towards a common goal. When we thank members for helping get closer to or even reaching our goals that bond in strengthened.

Luckily, reaping these benefits doesn't always need to be a big staged event with certificates and plaques – although it can be! Showing appreciation can be done in simple everyday ways such as:

- A big, friendly smile
- Sincere words of thanks
- Short, handwritten notes
- Emails or texts
- Small, inexpensive gifts
- Flowers from your yard
- A friendly pat on the back
- Words of praise shared on FaceBook or other club social media

Wouldn't you like to make someone in your club's day by showing some appreciation? Try to be specific and elaborate beyond just saying "thanks." By providing details, you will be able to show just how sincere you are. For example, "Without your organization skills our recruitment party would not have been so successful – Thank you!"

Remember, when we are genuine with our thanks, we boost morale. By recognizing our members and letting them know what they are doing is important – no matter how small or large the task – we improve the member experience.
