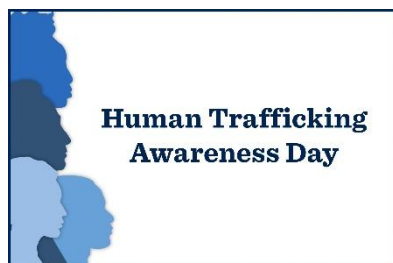

JANUARY 11, 2026 NATIONAL HUMAN TRAFFICKING AWARENESS DAY



National Human Trafficking Awareness Day in 2026 falls on Sunday, January 11th, a key date during National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month, with events like #WearBlueDay urging people to wear blue and raise awareness online using hashtags like #EndIt to combat human trafficking.

Key Details for 2026:

Date: January 11, 2026 (Sunday).

Focus: Highlighting the global issue of human trafficking and promoting prevention and survivor support.

#WearBlueDay: A major initiative where people wear blue and post pictures with #WearBlueDay and #EndIt to show solidarity and call attention to the crime.

How to Participate: Wear Blue: Wear blue clothing and draw a blue "X" on your hand. Share on Social Media: Post photos with #WearBlueDay and #EndIt.

Support Organizations: Volunteer or donate to groups fighting trafficking.

Host Events: Organize community discussions or film screenings.

This day is part of the larger observance of Human Trafficking Awareness Month in January, with various organizations holding events and webinars throughout the month.

POSITION PAPERS

Soroptimist International's Position Papers outline our global advocacy stance on key issues affecting women and girls. Each paper reflects our commitment to human rights, gender equality and the UN Sustainable Development Goals.

WHERE WE STAND HUMAN TRAFFICKING

POSITION SUMMARY

- Broadly defined, human trafficking is the forceful exploitation of a person.
- It was estimated that as of 2024, there were nearly 27 million victims of human trafficking globally.
- It is the second most lucrative illicit crime in the world with estimated profits of USD 236 billion annually.
- As human trafficking occurs everywhere and is

widespread there is an urgent need to create awareness about the real definition of human trafficking.

- Human trafficking remains a crime with a significant gender dimension, as many victims are women and girls, particularly exposed to physical and sexual violence, including but not limited to homicide and torture, psychological abuse, poor working and living conditions, often amounting to a form of modern-day slavery.

Human Trafficking may involve many other crimes such as:

- Labor Trafficking and Slavery Exploitation
- Trafficking specifically for sexual exploitation or pornography
- Trafficking of children for any of the above as well as forced marriage
- Organ Trafficking

WHERE THINGS NEED TO GO

Sustainable Development Goal Target 8.7 states that, to end modern slavery, trafficking and child labor, States and other stakeholders must "take immediate and effective measures to eradicate forced labor, end modern slavery and human trafficking and secure the prohibition and elimination of all forms of child labor by 2025."

It is essential that all stakeholders, including UN Member States, local authorities, businesses and more, address the specific vulnerabilities of all women and girls living in crisis contexts.

Trafficking of all women and girls of any form must be recognized as a form of violence. The gendered dimensions of vulnerability must be addressed through various means.

This can include:

- Investing in education and community-based programs that challenge social norms and male domination.
- Addressing the economic drivers and other vulnerability factors that may push women and girls to seek risky opportunities for income generation that could lead to their exploitation.
- Strengthening capacities of response teams in internally displaced person (IDP), refugee or large migration movement settings to better identify potential victims and ensure the safety and security all women and girls.
- Women's rights and survivors' organizations should inform gender-responsive crisis action plans and ensure their meaningful participation and access to influence in decision-making.

Shoppers found two wonderlands to choose from – Winter Wonderland and Alice in Wonderland. The latter was a few items from our Mad Hatter Tea Party

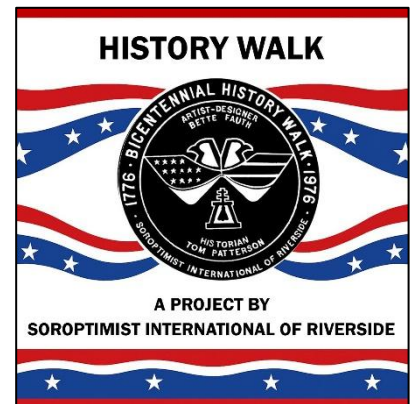

On December 9, 2025, the City of Riverside joyfully rededicated its History Walk, bringing the beloved landmark back to Main Street after spending 13 years in storage. Originally created in 1976 as a Bicentennial gift from Soroptimist International of Riverside, the walk has been carefully restored and now once again graces downtown with its commemorative stones.

The dedication celebration took place at Veterans Plaza, where community members gathered to witness the official return of the History Walk. Mayor Patricia Lock Dawson, Soroptimist International of Riverside President Lynn Scecina and History Walk Committee Chair Susan Exon each shared heartfelt remarks about the project's significance. Their speeches were followed by a ribbon-cutting ceremony led by Mayor Dawson beside a newly installed interpretive sign, symbolizing the walk's renewed place in Riverside's civic life.

Stretching along Main Street between 10th and 12th streets near the historic courthouse, the restored walk features 33 granite stones. Each marker highlights pivotal moments in Riverside's history, from the 1838 Rancho Jurupa land grant through 1998 when California Baptist College became California Baptist University, as well as milestones in agriculture, education and community development. Together, they tell the story of more than a century of civic and cultural heritage.

The rededication was not only a celebration of history but also of community collaboration. To ensure the walk's long-term preservation, local organizations and individuals joined forces to build an endowment. Support came from groups such as the Old Riverside Foundation, Friends

of the Mission Inn, Uptown Kiwanis, Riverside Historical Society, La Sierra University and many others including civic clubs, churches and community leaders demonstrating Riverside's shared commitment to honoring its past.

Following the ceremony, attendees were invited to tour the walk, pausing at each stone to reflect on the events and people who shaped the city. The History Walk now stands as both a tribute to Riverside's legacy and a promise to future generations that its stories will continue to be remembered.

Visitors can experience the History Walk by strolling down Main Street in downtown Riverside, where the commemorative stones are embedded in the sidewalk, waiting to share their stories with all who pass by.

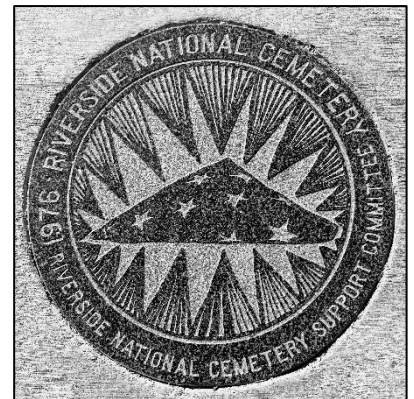

**“THE ANTHOLOGY
OF WOMEN IN
RIVERSIDE”**

In October 2025, the Riverside Historical Society released a remarkable new book titled “The Anthology of Women in Riverside, California 1870–1970.” Published as Occasional Publication No. 3, the anthology shines a light on the often overlooked contributions of women to Riverside’s growth and development during its first century.

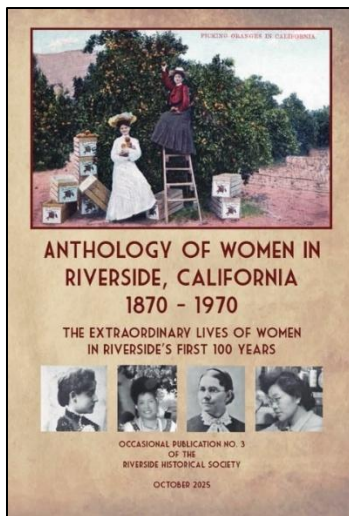
The book brings together 100 articles that profile a wide range of women and women’s organizations, including figures from diverse ethnic backgrounds whose stories have rarely been told. Among its notable profiles is Felicita Tortes Meyers, a Cahuilla woman celebrated for her exquisite basketry. By highlighting

stories like hers, the anthology seeks to correct the imbalance in Riverside’s historical record, where women have historically been represented in only 4% of the city’s landmarked sites.

Although the Riverside Historical Society published the anthology, the project beautifully reflects the mission of Soroptimist International of Riverside. Contributing a chapter, SI Riverside member Susan Exon highlighted the many ways the club has enriched the city and empowered women, continuing a legacy the Soroptimists are proud to share.

For those eager to explore the anthology, it is available at several local sites: Muse Market on Canyon Crest Drive, the Mission Inn Museum Store on Main Street and the research room of the Downtown Riverside Public Library.

By honoring these extraordinary women, the anthology restores their voices to Riverside’s history and secures their legacy for generations to come. It ensures that Riverside’s women are finally recognized for their remarkable contributions, something that Soroptimist International of Riverside is proud to support.
